

Global Modernism Network Symposium 2025

The second symposium of the Global Modernism Network took place at VUB on **19 – 20 June**, under the title *Of Intermediality*. Extending the dialogue opened in Paris, where the network's inaugural meeting circled the theme *Of Precariousness*, this gathering turned its attention to the ways in which different media intersect and converse within literary spaces.

Framed by the EUTOPIA alliance, the symposium brought together scholars from across the globe: from VUB, Stellenbosch University, CY Cergy Paris, the University of Warwick, King's College, London, and Washington University in St. Louis, each approaching the question of intermediality through distinct regional, historical, and aesthetic lenses. Their aim was to show how literature enters into dialogue with other forms: music, radio, visual arts: prints, painting, sketches. What emerged was a network of connections, not only between media, but between geographies and histories, too.

Much of the discussion turned toward the legacies of colonialism and their interrelation with modernist form and authorship, how these legacies continue to shape what counts as world literature, and who is allowed to speak within it. Case studies ranged widely: from South Africa to the South Pacific, from the Black Atlantic to India and Japan. Running through them all was a shared attention to the way modernist aesthetics remain charged by questions of identity, representation, and knowledge—making — then and now. The symposium did not seek to flatten these complexities. Rather, it opened up space for them: for interconnection, contradiction, and layered inquiry. What began as a conversation about media widened into an exploration of power, place, identity, and perception, setting profound opportunities for future research in the World of Global Modernism.



Building on the exciting new work being done in studies of life writing, auto/biography, literary studies, sound studies, and media studies, this conference seeks to explore the multifaceted realm of sonic life narratives, with a particular emphasis on their literary and artistic features, as well as listeners' individual and collective experiences. More specifically, it seeks to examine how audio life writing represents, mediates, and (re)constitutes lives; what aesthetic strategies are used and what effects they generate; how audio life narratives are received and remediated; as well as their inherent politics.





5 Journal for Literary and Intermedial Crossings

New Publication: Volume 9 | Issue 1 | 2024 | Crossings - Concept, Discourse, Practice

This special issue is occasioned by the eponymous 12th annual CLIC day in November 2022 and was edited by guest editors <u>Janine Hauthal</u> and <u>Arvi Sepp</u> (VUB).

The contributors to this issue explore the conceptual transversality of intermedially and transculturally oriented studies of crossings across medial, spatial, and historical axes. The media and genres they discuss range from autofiction on social media (Saemmer) and perceptions of literary translation through reader-generated social media posts (Sanz Gallego) to plurimedial theatre adaptations (Lacoue-Labarthe) and the embedding of visual art in literature (Mamatsashvili). While most contributions focus on 21st-century artworks, Manu's exploration of 19th-century Victorian whimsical satire provides an inspiring example of how historical depth and an appreciation of contemporary aesthetics can fruitfully converge in the study of generic crossings. The special issue concludes with two interviews that bring humanities scholarship and artistic practice into dialogue about crossings, focusing respectively on 21st-century street poetry by poets David Giannoni and Timotéo Sergoï (Gusella) and on the way cultural, geographical, and linguistic intersections have shaped Belgian British poet Patrick McGuinness as a 'writer of crossings' (Rosenfeld).



Targeted squarely at investigating the 'in-between,' the journal seeks contributions from scholars broadly covering medial, literary, generic, spatial and cultural crossings that bridge a plurality of potential discourses, modalities, and methodologies. This special issue, titled "Postmigration Beyond National Borders", aims to enhance the understanding of the postmigrant as analytical framework within literary and cultural studies. We invite contributions that explore how interdisciplinary dialogue across fields such as postcolonial studies, sociology, media and theatre studies can provide new conceptual insights into the analysis of contemporary artistic representations of belonging, identity and mobility within a postmigrant framework that transcends national borders and cultural contexts.


